# Open and Honest Care at Northumbria Healthcare NHS Foundation Trust : April 2017

This report is based on information from April 2017. The information is presented in three key categories: safety, experience and improvement. This report will also signpost you towards additional information about Northumbria Healthcare NHS Foundation Trust's performance.

## 1. SAFETY

### NHS Safety thermometer

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On one day each month we check to see how many of our patients suffered certain types of harm whilst in our care. We call this the safety thermometer. The safety thermometer looks at four harms: pressure ulcers, falls, blood clots and urine infections for those patients who have a urinary catheter in place. This helps us to understand where we need to make improvements. The score below shows the percentage of patients who did not experience any harms.

**94.4% of patients did not experience any of the four harms whilst an in patient in our hospital**

**93.7% of patients did not experience any of the four harms whilst we were providing their care in the community setting**

**Overall 94.0% of patients did not experience any of the four harms in this trust.**

### Health care associated infections (HCAIs)

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HCAIs are infections acquired as a result of healthcare interventions. Clostridium difficile (C.difficile) and methicillin-resistant staphylococcus aureus (MRSA) bacteremia are the most common. C.difficile is a type of bacterial infection that can affect the digestive system, causing diarrhoea, fever and painful abdominal cramps - and sometimes more serious complications. The bacteria does not normally affect healthy people, but because some antibiotics remove the 'good bacteria' in the gut that protect against C.difficile, people on these antibiotics are at greater risk.

The MRSA bacteria is often carried on the skin and inside the nose and throat. It is a particular problem in hospitals because if it gets into a break in the skin it can cause serious infections and blood poisoning. It is also more difficult to treat than other bacterial infections as it is resistant to a number of widely-used antibiotics.

We have a zero tolerance policy to infections and are working towards eradicating them; part of this process is to set improvement targets. If the number of actual cases is greater than the target then we have not improved enough. The table below shows the number of infections we have had this month, plus the improvement target and results for the year to date.

## Pressure ulcers

Pressure ulcers are localised injuries to the skin and/or underlying tissue as a result of pressure. They are sometimes known as bedsores. They can be classified into four categories, with one being the least severe and four being the most severe. **The pressure ulcers reported include all avoidable/unavoidable pressure ulcers that were obtained at any time during a hospital admission that were not present on initial assessment.**

This month 19 Category 2 - Category 4 validated pressure ulcers were acquired during Acute hospital stay and 7 in the community.

In the hospital setting, so we know if we are improving even if the number of patients we are caring for goes up or down, we calculate an average called 'rate per 1,000 occupied bed days'. This allows us to compare our improvement over time, but cannot be used to compare us with other hospitals, as their staff may report pressure ulcers in different ways, and their patients may be more or less vulnerable to developing pressure ulcers than our patients. For example, other hospitals may have younger or older patient populations, who are more or less mobile, or are undergoing treatment for different illnesses.

Rate per 1,000 bed days: 0.81 Hospital Setting

For the community setting we also calculate an average called 'rate per 10,000 CCG population.

Rate per 10,000 population: 0.23 North Tyneside

Rate per 10,000 population: 0.06 Northumberland

The pressure ulcer numbers include all pressure ulcers that occurred from 72 hours after admission to this Trust

In April 2017 we recorded the following ungradeable/unstageable pressure ulcers:

4 in the Acute setting

0 in the Community setting

*We use the term category or grading for pressure ulcers which are categorised or graded from 1-4 as per the National Institute Clinical Excellence (NICE) and European Pressure Ulcer Advisory Panel (EPUAP) guidance. Not all Pressure Ulcers can be categorised/graded and for these ulcers we use the term ungradeable/unstageable. An ungradeable ulcer cannot be graded as the base of the wound is not exposed and the true depth therefore cannot be determined. It takes time and treatment to expose the base of a wound and in some ulcers it may not be appropriate to do this. For reporting we record all ungradeable/unstageable ulcers as grade 3 until such time that the ulcer can be graded.*

## Falls

This measure includes all falls in the hospital that resulted in injury, categorised as moderate, severe or death, regardless of cause. **This includes avoidable and unavoidable falls sustained at any time during the hospital admission.** Falls within the community setting are not included in this report.

This month we reported fall(s) that caused at least 'moderate' harm.

So we can know if we are improving even if the number of patients we are caring for goes up or down, we also calculate an average called 'rate per 1,000 occupied bed days'. Rate per 1,000 bed days: 0.17

## 2. EXPERIENCE

To measure patient and staff experience we ask a number of questions. The idea is simple: if you like using a certain product or doing business with a particular company you like to share this experience with others.

The answers given are used to give a score which is the percentage of patients who responded that they would recommend our service to their friends and family.



### The Friends & Family Test

#### Patient experience

##### The Friends and Family Test

The Friends and Family Test requires all patients, after discharge from hospital, to be asked: *How likely are you to recommend our ward to friends and family if they needed similar care or treatment? We ask this question to patients who have been an in-patient and/or attended Accident & Emergency (A&E) or the Maternity service or in the community. All scores (if applicable) are below;*

<b>In-patient</b> FFT score <sup>1</sup>	<b>96.6</b>	% recommended. This is based on 1239 patients asked
<b>A&amp;E</b> FFT score	<b>84.7</b>	% recommended. This is based on 609 patients asked
<b>Maternity</b> FFT score	<b>98.4</b>	% recommended. This is based on 249 patients asked
<b>Community</b> FFT score	<b>98.9</b>	% recommended. This is based on 564 patients asked

### Staff Experience

Every quarter we ask our staff the following two questions (quarter three national staff survey). We ask these questions to different staff groups across the business units each quarter so all staff groups have the opportunity to respond. Staff from Community and Child Health Business Units participated in the quarter four results below;

How likely are you to recommend Northumbria Healthcare NHS Foundation Trust to friends and family if they needed care or treatment?	86.8%
How likely are you to recommend Northumbria Healthcare NHS Foundation Trust to friends and family as a place to work?	74.3%

The staff experience questions in quarter four were collected from 6th Feb until 6th March 2017. 2,381 staff were invited to participate of which we had 592 staff respond with a response rate of 25%.

### 3. IMPROVEMENT

Improvement story: we are listening to our patients and making changes

I saw Mr Aasad at Hexham. It wasn't long after that I was given a date for my surgery. Everything has gone as planned and I am getting better by the day. I was awake all throughout my operation. There was a screen in place so I couldn't see anything. I was having a good chat to one of the theatre nurses and the anaesthetist. Never in a million years did I think I could have had such major surgery under a local anaesthetic. I did have my other knee operated on about three years ago. I was given a general anaesthetic then and the difference it has made to me has been wonderful. I am up and starting to have physiotherapy and I don't feel bad at all, whereas with the general anaesthetic I was groggy for about three days which delayed my recovery. It's quite surprising to see how things and medicines have changed for the better in that short space of time.
